

Programme admission tests Jazz

1. Video recording

1.1 Instrument/vocals jazz

The video recording consists of two compositions from the jazz repertoire. Both compositions are different in tempo. See "[Repertoire video recording and live audition per instrument](#)" for more details. Candidates may accompany themselves (e.g. via backing track, play-along CD, etc.) or have themselves accompanied, depending on their capabilities. Playing without accompaniment or e.g. only playing with a metronome is also allowed.

FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

If you do not live in Belgium, the live audition can be replaced by additional recordings + an online meeting. International students who cannot come to the live audition must record all three pieces for round 1. See "[Repertoire video recording and live audition per instrument](#)" for more details. Send us recordings where we can see you playing with a live band.

If you are selected for round 2, you must send a recording of the compulsory piece within a week. For the recording of the compulsory piece, you may accompany yourself (e.g. via backing track, play-along CD, etc.) or let others accompany you. Playing without accompaniment or e.g. only with a metronome is also allowed for the recording of the compulsory piece.

During round 2 (the 'live audition'), you will be invited to come online for a motivational interview with the jury. Make sure you keep your instrument handy during this online interview, in case the jury wants to hear some additional exercises.

1.2 Live Electronics

The video recording consists of work that is representative of what the student candidate is working on. The video recording is filmed from a single point of view, where it should be clearly visible how the work is interpreted. The video recording lasts a minimum of 5, maximum 10 minutes.

2. Motivation video

Tell us why you want to come and study jazz at Antwerp Conservatory. Be sure to include the following questions:

- Why choose to study jazz?
- Why choose Antwerp Conservatoire?

- How long have you been playing your instrument?
- Where and with whom have you taken instrument lessons in the past?
- What field of study did you pursue in high school?
- Did you do any other studies after high school?

3. Live audition

3.1 Instrument/vocals jazz

- **Performance:** performing a prepared composition from the jazz repertoire. This composition should preferably be of a different tempo to the compositions on the video recording. The admissions committee may also request the candidate to perform one or both compositions from the video recording live. See "[Repertoire video recording and live audition per instrument](#)" for more details.
The candidate will be accompanied by an on-site rhythm section and must bring his/her own parts for these instruments (melody + chord progression will suffice).
- **Prima vista:** playing a prima vista a simple excerpt of a work from the jazz idiom: melody + improvisation (except bass) + chord progression (piano and guitar only).
- **Technique:** the admissions committee may ask the candidate to take a short technical test: major and minor scales, (broken) chords.
- **Ear training exercises:** the admissions committee may ask the candidate to imitate a melodic line or rhythmic pattern or to recognize chords or chord progressions.
- **Imposed work:** the candidate will be sent the imposed work by email one week prior to the admission test.

Repertoire video recording and live audition by instrument:

Trumpet, Trombone, Saxophone, Flute

1 blues, 1 ballad, 1 piece of the candidate's own choice (swing or Latin): melody + improvisation on each. Blues or choice piece in medium or fast tempo. Candidates choose which two pieces to record and which piece to prepare for the live test. If you wish, you may add to your recordings an additional piece in which you show a little more of your musical personality (e.g. own composition, other genre, ...)

Guitar

1 swing piece (medium or fast tempo), 1 ballad or medium-slow, 1 piece of the candidate's own choice. For each of these pieces: melody, improvisation on the chord progression and 1 chorus accompaniment to a piano solo. Candidates choose which two pieces to record and which piece to prepare for the live test. If you wish, you may add to your recordings an extra piece in which you show a little more of your musical personality (e.g. own composition, other genre, ...)

Double bass, Bass guitar

1 swing piece, 1 'even-eights' piece, 1 piece of the candidate's own choice. Candidates must incorporate the following elements into their playing: 1 theme, at least 1 improvisation, 'two-beat' and 'walking-bass'. Candidates choose which two pieces to record and which piece to prepare for the live test. If you wish, you may add an extra piece to your recordings in which you show a little more of your musical personality (e.g. own composition, other genre, ...)

Drums

2 swing pieces (1 piece or a fragment of it with brushes), 1 Latin piece. Improvisation: at least once '4 by 4' or '8 by 8' (interspersed with piano solo). Candidates choose which two pieces to record and which piece to prepare for the live test. If you wish, you may add to your recordings an extra piece in which you show a little more of your musical personality (e.g. own composition, other genre, ...)

Piano

1 swing piece, 1 ballad, 1 piece of the candidate's own choice; swing piece or choice piece in medium or fast tempo. For each of these pieces: melody, multiple choruses improvisation on the chord progression and 1 chorus accompaniment of a bass solo. Candidates choose which two pieces to record and which piece to prepare for the live test. If you wish, you may add to your recordings an extra piece in which you show a little more of your musical personality (e.g. own composition, other genre, ...)

Voice

1 blues (theme with or without lyrics, improvisation), 1 ballad (theme with lyrics, improvisation not compulsory), 1 standard (swing or Latin, medium fast tempo, theme with lyrics, improvisation with or without lyrics). Candidates choose which two pieces to record and which piece to prepare for the live test. If you wish, you may add to your recordings an extra piece in which you show a little more of your musical personality (e.g. own composition, other genre, ...)

3.2 Live Electronics

The live audition consists of work that is representative of what the student candidate is working on. The candidate is invited to play about 10 minutes, different music than the piece(s) of the video recording, preferably with improvisation involved. If you do not live in Belgium, the live audition can be replaced by an online audition.
